Martin Neary

MARTIN NEARY, a renowned English choral director, composer, and organist, is a leading exponent of contemporary British church music, and has introduced and championed many new church compositions by British composers, particularly John Tavener and Jonathan Harvey. Dr. Neary has been active as an organ recitalist and choral conductor throughout Europe and the United States, appearing at *Carnegie Hall, Alice Tully Hall, Royal Festival Hall*, the *BBC Proms*, and other major concert venues. He has a considerable discography spread over a variety of labels, including *Sony Classical, EMI, ASV*, and *Gaudeamus*.

Born in London, Martin Neary was a chorister at the Chapel Royal and later studied organ and theology at Gonville and Caius Colleges, Cambridge University. Among his most important teachers were organist/conductor Geraint Jones, organist André Marchal, and conductors Adrian Boult and Erich Leinsdorf.

Martin Neary first captured attention when he was awarded a prize at the 1963 St. Albans International Organ Festival. In 1965 he began a six-year tenure at St. Margaret's, Westminster, as Organist and Choirmaster. From 1972-1987 he served as Organist and Master of the Choristers at Winchester Cathedral and held the same position at Westminster Abbey from 1988-1999.

By the time he took his post at Westminster Abbey, Martin Neary was recognized as one of England's finest organists and choral conductors. In 1994 Neary led the Westminster Abbey Choir in concert at the Kremlin, becoming the first foreign ensemble to perform there. A year later he appeared on two *BBC* television programs leading live performances to mark the tercentenary of Purcell's death.

Dr. Neary is remembered by people throughout the world for his work in selecting and directing the music at the 1997 funeral of Princess Diana. The Queen of England appointed him as Lieutenant of the Royal Victorian Order in appreciation of his services at the funeral. Among his other numerous awards are an honorary doctorate of music from the University of Southampton, a Grammy nomination for his recording of Purcell's "Music for Queen Mary", and a Lambeth Doctorate in Music awarded by the Archbishop of Canterbury, in October 2012, "In recognition of his outstanding contribution at national and international level as an organist and conductor and of his sensitive and dynamic interpretation of sacred and secular music in the choral tradition."

Peggy Haas Howell

PEGGY HAAS HOWELL is the Organist and Choirmaster at St. John's Church and is the Music Director of Cantate Children's and Youth Choir of Central Virginia. She is well-known as an organ recitalist in the United States and Europe. This past July, she played at the International Organ Festival in Pelplin, Poland as well as concerts in Balatonlelle and Tihany, Hungary.

St. John's Choir

ST. JOHN'S CHOIR is a mixed choir that sings every Sunday and for special services in addition to presenting occasional concerts. In the summer of 2015, they were in residence at Wells Cathedral, England, as well as St. Davids Cathedral, Wales. They are planning another choir residency at Gloucester Cathedral in July of 2018. Peggy Haas Howell is the Organist and Choirmaster at St. John's.

Randolph College Chorale

THE RANDOLPH COLLEGE CHORALE frequently collaborates with community professional and volunteer ensembles in performing major works. The ensemble has performed in the Apollo Theater in Hermopoulis, Greece, Carnegie Hall, Washington National Cathedral, and is one of the very few choirs to be invited to sing in the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum. Dr. Randall Speer is the Director.

St. Paul's Choir

ST PAUL'S CHOIR sings for each Sunday liturgy in the year as well as additional holy days. The choir also supports the musicians of the parish's Celtic Evensong liturgy held throughout the year. St. Paul's celebrates and upholds the wonderful tradition of choral music in the Anglican Church. Sumner Jenkins is the Organist and Choirmaster at St. Paul's, Lynchburg.

Cantate

CANTATE CHILDREN'S AND YOUTH CHOIR OF CENTRAL VIRGINIA is an organization dedicated to bringing classical choral music to the youth of Central Virginia. Directed by Peggy Haas Howell, the choir is in residence at St. John's Church. Cantate's other performances this semester will a Family Holiday Concert with the Lynchburg Symphony Orchestra on December 10 at 7:00 p.m. at the Cavalier Theatre, Jefferson Forest High School and St. John's Festival of Christmas Lessons and Carols (see next page). Spring performances will include an appearance at St. Mark's Episcopal Church, Clifford, on February 12 at 4:00 p.m., participation in John Rutter's "Mass of the Children" with the Lynchburg Choral Union and chamber orchestra on April 22 at Snidow Chapel, and Cantate's annual spring concert on May 7th at 3:00 p.m. at St. John's Church. The 30 plus member group is open to children and youth from third grade through high school (boys with unchanged voices). Cantate meets on Monday afternoons from 4:00 p.m. until 6:00 p.m. in St. John's Choir Room. Cantabile includes the older and more experienced singers in the group. Funding for scholarships is provided by a grant from the Greater Lynchburg Community Trust. For more information or to arrange an audition for the spring semester, visit Cantatechoir.net.

Today's Program

The first portion of the concert will be music for "Evensong" - a special afternoon or evening worship service which consists almost entirely of liturgy sung by the choir, in a long-standing tradition of the British Isles. It's taking place with an eye to St. John's Choir residency at Gloucester Cathedral in 2018, and includes works by Charles Wood, Charles Villiers Stanford, Geoffrey Burgon, Peter Hurford, and Samuel Sebastian Wesley. Music for St. Cecilia, the patron saint of music, whose Saint's Day is celebrated on November 22nd, forms the next portion, and includes "Cantantibus Organis" by the Renaissance composer Peter Philips, and an equally rarely heard piece of the mid 20th-century, "A Hymn for St. Cecilia" by Herbert Howells with text by Ursula Vaughan Williams, the wife of the composer Ralph Vaughan Williams. The next portion is Music for All Saints Day, which takes place on November 1, and includes works by Richard Dering, Ralph Vaughan Williams, and the anthem "O how glorious is the kingdom" by Basil Harwood. The final work on the program is Benjamin Britten's stunning cantata for organ, choir, and soloists, "Rejoice in the Lamb", with 18th-century text by the Welsh-born poet Christopher Smart. Taken from Smart's poem "Jubilate Agno", "Rejoice in the Lamb" demonstrates Smart's belief that everything alive is connected to God. Smart was in an insane asylum when he wrote "Jubilate Agno".
